Finished Block: 7½" $\times 7^{1 ⁄ 21} 2^{\prime \prime}$

> Quilter's Basics
> Read instructions before beginning a project. All instructions include a $1 / 4$ " seam allowance.

> Press as you go. Press seams in one direction.
> $22^{\prime \prime}$ measurement is approximate.

Note: The following cutting instructions are written for piecing this project without a moda kit.
If you are using Moda Kit 46180 please refer to only the cutting directions highlighted in red. Please note that Fabrics 1, 6, 7, 8 \& 21 have been cut into multiple pieces in the kit- Example: In the kit Fabric 1 includes two $1 / 1 /$ yard cuts with the reds plus a a $3 / 4$ yard cut for binding.

Important: Label and sort the various parts as they are cut.

## Cutting

Reds

## Fabric 1

Cut: 2-9"xWOF strips for triangles
Cut: $9-2 \underline{1} / 2$ "xWOF strips for binding
from $3 / 4$ yard piece

## Fabrics 6, 7, 8

Cut: $2-9$ "xWOF strips for triangles
Fabrics 1-8
Cut all 12 red $1 / 4$ yd. cuts in half at the fold to make $2-9$ "x 22 " strips. Set aside strip of each.
Creams \& Tans

## Fabrics 9-20

Cut all 12 cream $/ \tan 1 / 4 \mathrm{yd}$, cuts in half at the fold to make 2-9"x 22 " strips. Set aside 1 strip of each.
Browns
Fabric 21
Cut: 1-12"x WOF strip for large triangles Side aside remaining fabric for Outer Border

Fabrics 21-28 (8 total)
Note: Cut carefully as you will use most all of each strip. From each 12 " strip cut $5-83 / 8^{\prime \prime} \times 838^{\prime \prime}$ squares cut once diagonally for a total of 80 large half square triangles (you will need 76).

## Construction

1. Layer 1 cream and 1 red $9 " \times 22^{\prime \prime}$ strip right sides together.
2. Cut a 6 "column" strip of Half Square Triangles on a Roll paper.
3. Center and pin paper to layered red and cream pair. See diagram.
4. Stitch on dotted line and cut on solid lines to make 24 half square triangle units. Press toward reds.
5. Repeat Steps $1-4$ using the eleven red and eleven cream strips to make a total of 288 half square triangle units. (You will need 264.)

2½" Finished Triangle Paper


Stitch on dotted line and cut on solid lines to make 24 half square triangle units from each of the 12 red/cream pairs.

## Remaining Strips

From each of the remaining red and cream 9"x22" strips cut $5-33 / 8^{\prime \prime} \times 33 / 8$ " squares; cut once diagonally to make 10 half square triangles. Sort into groups for a total of 120 red and 120 cream half square triangles.

## Building Blocks

Block A: 9-Patch - Make 4
Each block requires 9 half square triangle units. Note placement and direction of red triangles.

Block B: Light corner - Make 36
Each block requires 3 half square triangle units, 3 cream $33 / 8$ " half square triangles and 1 large $83 / 8$ " brown half square triangle. Stitch together following the diagram. Press following the arrows. Note: You will have 12 extra cream blocks.

Block C: Red corner - Make 40
Each block requires 3 half square triangle units, 3 red $33 / 8^{"}$ half square triangles and 1 large $83 / 8$ " brown half square triangle. Stitch together following the dagram. Press following the arrows.

## Assemble Quilt Top



This quilt top is built in 4 sections. Each section contains 5 rows with 4 blocks per row. Make 2 left sections and 2 right sections to complete this quilt top. Refer to the diagrams at right for block placemont and pressing directions.

Left Section - Make 2


Right Section - Make 2


Join 1 left and 1 right section. Press seam toward left section. Repeat with remaining sections. Rotate second set $180^{\circ}$ and stitch to the bottom of the first sections. Press.
Note: the 4 Block A's should be in each of the four corners of the quilt top.
Quilt top should measure $601 / 2$ "x $751 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ with seams.

## Outer Border

Note: The borders for this quilt are torn from the length of fabric. Why tearing instead of cutting? Ifyou mark and clip precisely, each border strip will be the same width and the motifs will appear in the same exact position on each border strip.

## Preparing the Borders

1. Clip the raw edge of fabric (approx. $1^{1 / 2}$ deep) just inside the white printed selvage.
2. Measure $91 / 4$ " to the right from the first clip. Clip again.
3. Measure over $91 / 4$ " to the right three additional times clipping the edge of the border fabric each time.
4. Begin at selvage clip and tear away the selvage. Repeat with the remaining clips to create $4-9 \frac{1}{4} \mathrm{x}$ length of fabric border strips (approx $96^{\prime \prime}$ ). Press each strip before cutting and adding to quilt top.


## Adding the Borders

Note: The border strips are extra long to allow for the alignment of the border motifs. Before cutting the border strips below, we suggest you audition the borders for placement. You might need to cut the border strip at both the beginning and the end of the strip to achieve the best positioning of the print.

1. Measure the length of the quilt top from top to bottom through the center (approx. $751 / 2$ "). Cut two border strips to that measurement.
2. Please note the motifs of this border "chase" around the quilt top. Stitch one border strip to the side of the quilt top with the leaf motif facing the center of the quilt top. Rotate the second border strip so the leaf motif is also facing the center of the quilt top and stitch to the opposite side. Press toward the border.
3. Measure quilt top through the center from side to side including the borders (approx. 78").

Cut the remaining two border strips to that measurement. Add to top and bottom of quilt top. Press toward border.

Quilt top should measure 78"x93" with seams.

## Finishing

1. Using a diagonal seam, join the $9-21 / 2$ "xWOF strips end to end. Press seams open. Fold prepared strip in half wrong sides together and press to make the binding.
2. Layer, Quilt and Bind.
